ABIDE

I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. John 15:5

Apart from me you can do nothing? Nothing?! Really? Does this passage seem a little over the top to you, or is it just me? I feel like I can do plenty on my own. Can't you? And yet, when I stop and think about it, how often does that "plenty" I can do on my own leave me feeling scattered and burned out?

The vine is what is connected to the roots, the vine brings the sustenance, the needed elements for survival. The branches are natural outgrowths from the vine. Branches cannot just decide they are better off on their own and leave the vine, and if they think their thriving is only a result of their own striving, they are misguided. The only way for them to grow and thrive is for them to be connected to the thriving roots. This naturally happens when they stay connected to the vine.

Recently I was driving and noticed a tree growing a median. It appeared to be a crepe myrtle, growing in two sections. One was covered in green leaves, the other completely bare. The bare section was leaning slightly more than it should. I wondered what wind, weather, or other trauma caused it to bend, separating it from its roots. If it hadn't been spring, I might not have noticed that half of this tree was disconnected from its roots. But with the robust growth on the other half, the disparity was obvious. I was struck by this image and felt some kind of solidarity with the disconnected half. I thought, "but at least it is still standing!" Just because you are still standing doesn't mean you are healthy, thriving, or bearing fruit. How often is "still standing" our standard? And I wonder, is that good enough?

This is not a call to compare ourselves to the fruiting or flowering of others- but to assess our roots. Are we connected to Christ, able to abide in Him and reach our full potential? Are we barely hanging on and calling that good enough, when we are meant for more?

Maybe instead of trying to prove Jesus wrong and parse out what I can and cannot do on my own, I should take this gift away from this passage: I do not HAVE to do it alone, and neither do you. For that I am grateful. Thanks be to God. Amen.

Clergy Thriving Grants can be up to \$2,500 to support Clergy Thriving. There is a competitive grant cycle, with applications due by May 15. These grants are separate from \$500 COP Grants, for which clergy are eligible upon successful completion of the Communities of Practice Year.

The retreat at St. Francis Springs Prayer Center offered our group an opportunity to deepen our fellowship, learn from one another, and grow in our commitment to ministry in retirement. The communion service on the last day of our retreat was especially meaningful, with both United Methodist and United Church of Christ pastors officiating.
